So much design

these days is about European trends, injectionmoulded plastics and \$10,000 light fixtures that it's refreshing to behold an interior that eschews the "next best thing." That's not to say that today's style is capricious. But when you see a home like Sappho Griffin's, in the enclave of Bedford, N.S., you know it was decorated by an individual with real soul.

Bedford, a forested seaside community 15 minutes from downtown Halifax, is possibly as romantic as urban living gets in Canada. By turns misty and sun-soaked, it hugs the

Atlantic like a summer resort. For a place to grow up, or to grow old, you can't do much better. Or so says Sappho, who chose to settle here seven years ago.

She was born in Vancouver and grew up in Toronto, where her mother, JoAnn Griffin, was an avid collector and dealer of antiques and McCoy pottery (her collections have appeared in previous issues of House & Home). In her twenties, Sappho moved back out to Vancouver and took a job with the antique and reproduction furniture store Folkart Interiors, where she learned the arts of furniture design, restoration and custom-finishing.

She might still be in Vancouver if it weren't for the city's housing market ("Crazy!"), the rat race ("It was getting a little like Toronto") and her husband, Andrew Starzomski, a Nova Scotia native. Yearning to escape the pressure to work longer hours, discover a TOP RIGHT: Sappho painted the breakfast nook a soft khaki.
